Dave McLeod was not in attendance, so will hear from him at February meeting as regards the Red Bank/Sunny Corner and New Jersey/Neguac CBCs. Those that were in the New Jersey/Neguac count on January 3 said there were not many birds – even starlings were few!

## Media

Giv'er Magazine – we do not have deadlines yet for the winter and spring issues. But we do need articles. Or if someone has an idea, someone else can write up the article. Deana Gadd suggested an article on trees in winter, but someone would need to write it.
